

From women to women

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Brief

Creation of a menstrual hygiene kit for women in India, containing 7 pads and soap to tackle the issue of period poverty and social stigma.

Kit componets

The kit will contain 7 pads and an organic soap which are eco-friendly and bio-degradable products.

The natural soap can be created using acids (lactic and/or citric), prebiotics and natural preservatives and should not contain parabens, surfactants, fragrances, essential oils, and herbal extracts.





Budget

Total estimated cost: 60 INR

Cost of 7 pads: 21 INR

Cost of soap: 20 INR

Production cost including materials: 20 INR

Concept

Creation of a health kit for women in India, using:

- Natural materials
- Materials available in India at low cost
- Using Indian techniques and designs
- Creating a project that can be easily reproduced by Indian women

- handy





Sewing Prototypes

First we finalized a shhape, and then the fabric pieces were cut to the right dimensions.
They were then assembled using the sewing machine.

Natural fabric dyeing

For the dyeing of fabrics, natural dyes readily available in India were used.



Natural dyeing

Natural dyeing must follow three steps.

- *dye rising on the fibre due to the effect of temperature*
- colour is fixed using alkali
- high-temperature soaps remove the surplus of dye that has not reacted with the fibres.





Block printing tecnique

This technique involves manual imprinting using wooden matrices on which the desired design is engraved in negative.















Block printing tecnique



Block printing has been used in India since at least the 12th century, and the method is thought to be 2,000 years old.

This technique is widespread in different states in India and is easy to produce. The materials and tools required are easy to procure.

It can be customisable, allowing to produce many variations n the same product, making the pouch valuable and unique.

Block printing tecnique



The desired dye is poured onto a sponge sheet, and the wooden block is soaked in it, which is then placed and pressed onto the surface until the print is obtained.







Labels were designed to be placed inside the kit to explain to Indian women how to use the products within it.

For the creation of the labels, it was decided to use the same technique as for block printing, i.e. applying an established shape to the fabric.

To create the block, material linoleum was manually engraved in the different parts, so that it could then function as a block to apply the colour.








Empowering women


To empower women, we thought of creating instructions explaining the creation of the kit, so that Indian women could recreate it themselves and earn money from the sale of it.

किट सिलने के लिए



कपड़े को उल्टा घुमाएं और बिंदीदार रेखाओं के साथ मोड़ें और सिलाई करें



कपड़े को आधे में मोड़ें और किनारों को बंद करके सिलाई करें, ऊपर के हिस्से को खुला छोड़ दें



खुले भाग के चारों ओर एक रस्सी या रिबन डालें



किट को बंद करने के लिए, रस्सी या रिबन को दोनों तरफ से खींचें
